# The Past, The Present and the Future

Allergy in Hong Kong (1996 – 2016)





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Since its inception in 1996, the Hong Kong Institute of Allergy has made significant efforts to promote the awareness of allergic diseases among medical professionals and the public. It also brings to the local medical community cutting edge knowledge on the management of allergic diseases and is committed to improving the well-being of patients suffering from allergy. The Institute has now become a 400-strong professional body whose members share a common goal of promoting the discipline of allergy in Hong Kong.



Allergies are among the most common chronic conditions affecting both adults and children. It is estimated that one in three children in Hong Kong suffer from at least one allergic condition. Statistics also show that more than 330,000 Hong Kong people suffer from asthma while some 400,000 patients treated by the Hospital Authority have drug allergies.

Mindful of the prevalence of this health problem, the Government has been taking active actions on all fronts. The Hospital Authority provides comprehensive treatment for patients with allergy. The Department of Health promotes ways to reduce the risk of developing allergies such as a smokefree living environment and optimal infant and young child feeding practices. The Environmental Protection Department's efforts in improving air quality also contribute to allergy prevention.

Yet health education and disease prevention are by far the most important. The Institute has made commendable efforts over the past two decades to reach out to the community and the medical sector to enhance the management of allergic diseases in Hong Kong. On this auspicious occasion of its 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary, I would like to send my most sincere thanks to the Institute for its contributions to public health, and look forward to more of its good endeavours in the future.

Allergy is one of the most common chronic illnesses in Hong Kong. It may take the form of allergic rhinitis, ocular allergy, atopic dermatitis, asthma, food allergy and insect allergy.



# Hong Kong Institute of Allergy – the Past, the Present and the Future

This year is the 20<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Hong Kong Institute of Allergy (HKIA). It is the privilege of the President and Council to shepherd the Institute through the year of celebration of which the centerpiece is the International Allergy Convention (8 – 9 October 2016 · *Novel Strategies for Prevention and Treatment of Allergic Disorders*). This year's scientific festival is a collaboration between ourselves as the host and the British Society for Allergy and Clinical Immunology, European Academy of Allergy and Clinical Immunology and the American College of Allergy Asthma and Immunology.



The HKIA's biennial Convention has always been a notable event in the Conference Calendar and HKIA is delighted to welcome again an exceptional faculty, our distinguished guests as well as many longstanding and new friends to join in the festivities. Thank you very much for your support.

#### The Past

The HKIA was founded in 1996 by a group of like minded colleagues as a professional forum for fellowship, education and scientific exchange in Allergy. While HKIA has made progress, it has not been an easy journey to grow Allergy as a discipline in Hong Kong. Specialists at the universities including but not exclusive to those in General Medicine, Respiratory Medicine, Otorhinolaryngology, Paediatrics and Dermatology have done their best to teach students about the management of some allergic diseases. However the relative lack of Allergy specialists in Hong Kong has hampered further growth of the discipline. In the absence of specialists there can be no trainers and without trainers there can be no trainees, so the problem becomes self perpetuating. This is not of course a problem unique to Hong Kong.

Several key developments for the discipline of Allergy in Hong Kong, partly fortuitously and partly by design, came together in 2014 to transform a stream into a flood releasing a cascade of renewed enthusiasm and activity. These developments included the recognition after several years of epidemiological research at our own Universities and at Institutions overseas that Hong Kong is in the midst of an allergy epidemic. Many allergic diseases in HK, such as food allergies, were becoming increasingly common and severe as seen in the rest of the world including mainland China and the Asia Pacific.



At the same time an informal grouping, named the Hong Kong Allergy Alliance, was convened to provide a leadership framework to integrate separate groups into a collective multi-professional voice to promote the discipline and to lobby for better clinical services for allergic patients.

The Allergy Alliance's first major project was to survey the provision of Allergy Services in Hong Kong. Its findings highlighted the markedly insufficient numbers of Allergy-trained doctors in Hong Kong, especially in adult medicine. The paediatric population was better served and there was a successful Paediatric Immunology and Infectious Diseases training programme. Nonetheless the numbers of Paediatric Allergists were also inadequate as the Paediatricians involved were only working part time in Allergy. Furthermore as there were no adult Allergists in the public sector transitional care for allergy from childhood to adulthood was a major difficulty.

#### **The Present**

The unmet need had to be addressed and thus a sleepy dragon was awakened. HKIA and the Hong Kong Allergy Alliance had already been working closely together and in 2015 their activities were combined to avoid duplication. This integration occurred at a key moment in HKIA's history as the Institute had already decided to increase the breadth of its activities a few months earlier following a comprehensive strategy planning meeting. Ten subcommittees were formed including one on service development. Each subcommittee had a challenging portfolio to promote major policy areas. MIMS was appointed to provide a much needed Secretariat. Finally we were delighted when Dr. Wing-man Ko, Secretary for Food and Health of Hong Kong, accepted our invitation to become the Institute's Patron. Therefore a strong leadership platform had been created to drive forward HKIA's ambitious agenda.

In the last 18 months HKIA is on a remarkably steep upward trajectory. Under the guidance of Dr. Johnny Chan and Dr. Kit-man Sin the membership has almost doubled overall. Even more striking has been the enormous interest shown by allied health professionals, especially nurses and dietitians, who appear to have an insatiable thirst to learn about allergic disorders and their management. There is an impressive 4-fold increase in the numbers of members in the allied health professionals' category driven by the leadership of Ms. June Chan and Ms. Maggie Lit.

HKIA now hosts frequent symposia and courses in Allergy which are always fully attended and sometimes even over-subscribed. HKIA has published already several clinical Allergy practice guidelines for Hong Kong and others will follow. Dr. Helen Chan, Dr. Fanny Ko and Dr. Gilbert Chua have established an informative mobile optimized webpage, facebook and twitter digital platforms so that HKIA can reach more people. The Institute publishes two newsletters annually edited by Dr. Jane Chan and her team of sub-editors. Articles on important developments in Allergy involving

HKIA members are published in peer reviewed scientific journals and appear regularly in both the local Chinese and English media. HKIA and other colleagues have worked with the Environment Protection Department in the Government of HKSAR to produce a series of educational video clips for the lay public about urban pollution entitled 'Clean Air and You'.

HKIA offers scholarships to its members to train overseas and provides travel grants for them to attend Allergy conferences. In addition Professor Gary Wong and colleagues have launched a new competitive pilot grant scheme funded by HKIA that will support collection of preliminary data by HKIA members to strengthen subsequent applications to major research agencies.

Finally HKIA is amending its constitution to enlarge the size of its governing Council and to establish defined terms of service for its members so that younger colleagues can be recruited to be nurtured as future leaders.

As a result of all the new activities, the profile of the discipline in Hong Kong has increased markedly. While it is unrealistic to expect clinical services to have been transformed in less than two years, training in Allergy has been enhanced significantly. For instance the training curriculum for adult Allergy has been revised and will be approved shortly by the Hong Kong College of Physicians. Moreover at Queen Mary Hospital/HKU a new training post in adult Allergy; three paediatric trainee/fellowship posts with an interest in Allergy; and an Immunology/Allergy trainee post in Pathology have been created. In addition a multidisciplinary transitional allergy service for children and adults has been established. At Prince of Wales Hospital/CUHK there are four new paediatric trainees working in Allergy, Immunology and Infectious Diseases. A number of existing trainees in related specialties at other public Hospitals are also investigating training and career opportunities in Allergy.

The Institute cannot drive forward its agenda alone and it is delighted to have a productive collaboration and/or dialogue with partners that include but not limited to HK Allergy Association; Environment Protection Department of the HKSAR Government; sister societies in related disciplines; the Federation of Medical Societies; the Universities; the respective Hong Kong Colleges of Physicians, Paediatricians and Pathologists; The Hospital Authority; and the Industry.

#### The Future

HKIA is committed to continue promoting a vigorous tripartite agenda at the clinical/academic interface to help improve Allergy services; create more opportunities for training of aspiring Allergists and other health professionals with an Allergy interest; and to promote an environment to facilitate discovery of new knowledge, for example in the fast growing area of allergy prevention. It wants to grow in an inclusive manner with vision and energy. This will not happen overnight but HKIA is making gratifying progress.



The recent significant influx of new Allergy trainees and fellows is very encouraging and bodes well for the future growth of the discipline in Hong Kong. The challenge now is to develop an exit strategy so that Allergy trainees have a clear career path after they complete their training.

For our junior doctors there is no better time to become an Allergist. The clinical load of allergic disease is enormous and specialists are urgently required. A powerful array of molecular and bioinformatic tools are now available to dissect mechanisms of disease at relatively low cost. This will help to identify biomarkers, which will facilitate definition of allergic disease subtypes. In turn this knowledge can be exploited to provide increasingly personalised approaches to existing and new therapies. I cannot recall a more exciting time to be practicing medicine and Allergic Diseases provide unique opportunities.

In the next decade or less, I am confident that HKIA under the guidance of a vibrant leadership and a supportive membership will realize the aspirations of its visionary founders for the benefit of our professional and patient communities.

# Hong Kong Institute of Allergy – From its Birth to a New Chapter

In the early 1990s, unlike North America and other regions, allergic disorders were under-recognized in Hong Kong and public knowledge of allergies was very poor. The study of allergy was not regarded as a medical discipline, despite its long history of more than a century. Healthcare professionals had limited knowledge of allergic diseases. Hence, root causes of allergic diseases were often missed or unaddressed and preventative strategies were not adopted as they should be. Back then, only a meagre minority of physicians accepted allergy testing; many found immunotherapy a far-fetched myth, even akin to witchcraft. The lack of formal training for allergy specialists had hampered right and effective treatment for allergy sufferers.



In light of the dire need of allergy awareness among medical professionals amid growing prevalence of allergic disorders in Hong Kong, a group of dermatologists, otolaryngologists, paediatricians and respiratory physicians gave birth to the Hong Kong Institute of Allergy (HKIA) in 1996. The missions of the HKIA are to introduce and promote allergy as a medical discipline and to foster a professional forum for fellowship and scientific exchange for the benefits of allergic patients in Hong Kong. Since its launch, the HKIA has been recruiting members from different medical and allied health disciplines. It is dedicated to bringing cutting-edge knowledge on the management of allergic diseases in the medical community, training aspiring allergists and allied health professionals, and promoting clinical services and research as well as public education.

Over the last two decades, the HKIA has established strong connections with local, regional and international allergy organizations, including the Hong Kong Allergy Association, the World Allergy Organization, the American College of Allergy, Asthma and Immunology (ACAAI), Asia Pacific Association of Allergy, Asthma and Clinical Immunology (APAAACI), the British Society for Allergy and Clinical Immunology (BSACI), the European Academy of Allergy and Clinical Immunology (EAACI) and the Japanese Society of Allergology (JSA). The close ties between HKIA and these professional associations allow us to support each other in scientific exchange and promoting activities related to the allergy discipline, both in Hong Kong and internationally.



In the past twenty years, conventions have formed a great part of the agenda of HKIA. Our first Hong Kong Allergy Convention (HKAC) was supported by the ACAAI and successfully held in 1998. The convention featured distinguished overseas speakers to share their knowledge and insights in the latest advances on the management of allergy and asthma and attracted many local and international delegates to attend. This convention brought international attention and recognition to the HKIA and has now become a highly reputed event held biennially in the city. Until now, it is an important part of the conference calendar for a wide spectrum of medical professionals, including general practitioners, allergists, immunologists and related disciplines, and allied health professionals, in Hong Kong and beyond. We are looking forward to the 9<sup>th</sup> HKAC to be held at the Hong Kong Convention & Exhibition Centre on 8 - 9 October 2016 with the support of ACAAI, BSACI and EAACI.

The HKIA is working to establish more partnerships in the Pan-Asian region. Notably, the HKIA is most excited for the opportunity to bid for organizing the APAAACI convention in Hong Kong in 2020. This will be undoubtedly another milestone in the history of HKIA.

What must also be mentioned is HKIA's work with mainland China. In earlier years, HKIA has supported the mainland to develop allergy as a discipline. Through our collaborations, the mainland has successfully developed their own systems to provide sustainable training for allergy-related medical personnel in Guangzhou, Beijing, Shanxi and Xian. It is HKIA's honour to witness the fast-paced growth of the allergy discipline in China over a span of two decades.

Educating medical doctors and allied health professionals have been a top priority of HKIA. Besides organizing conventions for knowledge exchange, the HKIA also sponsors members to attend local and international scientific meetings, offers scholarships annually for training, study or research programmes overseas, and hosts many medical symposia and clinical meetings to update members on recent scientific advances in allergy. The HKIA endeavours to facilitate professional development of its members and to translate knowledge to clinical practice, which ultimately benefits patients who have been struggling to cope with allergic diseases. After almost twenty years of hard work, the HKIA is reaping rewards of increasing recognition of allergy among medical practitioners and growing acceptance of allergy testing. This is clearly evident in the availability of allergy testing in almost every diagnostic laboratory in the city, reflecting a high demand for allergy assessments prescribed by practitioners.

Promoting allergy as a recognized medical discipline has been a major goal of the HKIA. In recent years, the HKIA has been liaising with the two medical schools in Hong Kong to establish a standalone Department of Allergy. With sufficient funding, the HKIA wishes to secure professorships specific to allergy at the two universities. We strongly believe that only with an official, established department in the medical schools can sustainable development of the discipline be achieved. These institutional changes can springboard more doctors to become clinical allergists or immunologists to meet the high unmet needs of allergy patients. In this regard, the HKIA will continue to persuade the universities to pioneer professional training for the making of more in-demand allergy specialists.

Supporting clinical research is also one of the clear objectives of the HKIA. Throughout the years, the HKIA has funded research on epidemiological and clinical studies of asthma, food allergies, allergic rhinitis and other allergic disorders. It has also participated in large-scale studies, such as the International Study of Asthma and Allergies in Childhood (ISAAC). The HKIA continues to explore ways to help research efforts, including support for implementation of a translational research approach through clinical academic centres of excellence. In the future and when funds are available, it may also initiate research in other areas, such as validation or repudiation of unconventional allergy diagnostic tests being offered to patients.

Promoting public education and improving the wellbeing of allergy patients are essential missions of HKIA. The Institute has hosted many public talks and press conferences and published educational articles on newspapers to help the public understand more about common allergic disorders, such as allergic rhinitis, ocular allergy, atopic dermatitis, asthma, food allergy and insect allergy, and how they are managed. The HKIA also partners the Environmental Protection Department to educate the public on the health risk of air quality and what they can do to protect the environment through a series of YouTube videos.

With an increasing demand for dedicated clinical services, the HKIA has been most proud to have pushed forward the setup of two allergy clinics at the Chinese University of Hong Kong. Patients may now have proper allergy assessments and treatment by doctors' referral. Yet, the HKIA envisions more specialty clinics operating in different areas in Hong Kong to improve patients' accessibility to clinical services related to allergy. It is continuing to work closely with the public and private sectors to accomplish this goal.

From our humble beginnings, the HKIA has now developed to a substantial body of over seven hundred members. The HKIA should rightly proud of its achievements, but none could have happened without the foresight and commitment of the many who have journeyed with us. We would like to take this opportunity to express our heartfelt gratitude for the following people: the founding members, the late Dr. Avery Chan, Dr. Ka-ho Chan, Dr. Jane Chan, Dr. Christopher Lai, Dr. John Leung, Professor William Wei, the late Dr. William Yip, Dr. Donald Yu, Dr. Hipcho Yu and Dr. Patrick Yuen, and the generations of Council Members for their hard work and



dedication; the current HKIA President, Dr. Tak-hong Lee, for his leadership and support; and Dr. Sami Bahna, who was the President of ACAAI when we first started, for his mentorship and timely assistance throughout the years. Special thanks to Dr. John Leung who has given the name of "Hong Kong Institute of Allergy" and its spirits! With continued support from our members and partners, the HKIA is confident that our remarkable successes will be sustained and expanded in the future.
